2021 PAVING PROGRAM: FROM THE VILLAGE ENGINEER'S OFFICE

The Village of Hartland's annual paving and roadway rehabilitation program, which is budgeted and planned for in the biannual Capital Improvement Planning, involves the milling and asphalt overlay of **E. Capitol Drive** from Maple Avenue to North Avenue and **North Avenue** from STH "16" to E. Capitol Drive. Village Engineer, Ruekert & Mielke has worked with Village Staff to structure the work to minimize inconvenience to the residents and business owners in the area. It is nearly impossible to complete any improvement that requires work on a roadway without some inconvenience to the public. However, we have established an accelerated schedule to allow this project to be completed within weeks and not months.

The Contractor for this work is Wolf Paving Co., Inc. A tentative schedule that is dependent entirely on weather has been established. Please note that the Contractor is only permitted to work between the hours of 6am and 8pm unless the Village gives approval to work outside of these hours.

The project area will be split up by roadway. When work is occurring on E. Capitol Dr., parking and traffic will be unobstructed on North Ave. and likewise when work is occurring on North Ave. There will be NO PARKING on the roadway that is being worked on for the entire duration of the road work. This disruption is only expected for 5 days on each roadway. When work is occurring on E. Capitol Dr. there will be **one way traffic from west to east between North Ave. and Maple Ave.** Please pay attention to signs when traveling through this area. Two way traffic will still occur on North Ave. while it is under construction. Please note that these roadways will be "Closed to Thru Traffic" which means that you can still access businesses and residences but that if you are just passing through the area, please find an alternative route. Please be vigilant when driving or walking through the project area and pay attention to the direction of construction personnel. They will get you where you need to go safely.

You may sign up for project status alerts through the Village's website. To sign up for these notifications, go to the Village's website www.villageofhartland.com. Hover over "I Want To..." in the menu and click on "E-Notification" which is listed under "Register". You will be prompted to enter your email address and click "sign in" to manage your subscriptions. Construction Statute Updates are listed under "Notify Me". Select either the envelope icon to receive notifications by email or the phone icon to receive notifications by text.

SECURITY

Please take time to keep your vehicles locked when unattended in parking lots, at work or in your driveway overnight. While Hartland enjoys a small-town charm, we have crimes of opportunity especially in the warm weather months. Additionally, do not leave valuables visible in parked motor vehicles.

We receive many complaints about scams over the phone and via the internet. There are numerous variations of these scams, but some general guidelines can help you from being the victim of fraud. Do not react quickly with giving money to others. Take the time to verify who and why you are giving money. If it does not seem right, don't do it. If you are not sure, speak to someone you trust for an opinion before acting. If in doubt, call the police department as we may have had other complaints about the particular scam.

DRUG COLLECTION

In order to reduce substance abuse and the risk of improper use of medications, the police department collects unwanted prescription medications, sprays, inhalers, ointments, creams, vials, herbals or pet medications in our lobbies 24 hours a day. Illegal drugs or paraphernalia may also be placed in these boxes and no questions are asked. The green containers in the Village Hall lobbies are the collection site for these items. Please do not put any hazardous materials or waste such as household cleaners, paint, etc. in the boxes. Do not flush your old medication down a toilet; bring them to us. In the last 6 months, we have collected over 554 pounds of unneeded medications that were destroyed. If you have questions, please call the Police Department at (262) 367-2323.



CROSSWALK SAFETY

Here is some important information to know when you are walking across the street or driving a car on a roadway. Wisconsin state Statute 346.24 explains the duties of both pedestrians and drivers when a pedestrian is crossing the roadway. There are three important points to remember when walking or driving on the roadway as it relates to crosswalks (MARKED OR UNMARKED) or when approaching an intersection:

1. The driver of a car/truck shall yield the right-of-way to a pedestrian, bicyclist, or electric personal assistive mobility device, consistent with the safe use of the crosswalk by anyone crossing the roadway within a marked or unmarked crosswalk. The pedestrian has to be in the crosswalk (marked or unmarked)!
2. No pedestrian, bicyclist, or rider of an electric personal assistive mobility device shall suddenly leave a curb or other place of safety and walk, run, or ride into the path of a vehicle which is so close that it is difficult for the operator of the vehicle to yield.
3. Whenever any vehicle is stopped at an intersection or crosswalk to permit a pedestrian, bicyclist, or rider of an electric personal assistive mobility device to cross the roadway, the operator of any other vehicle approaching from the rear shall not overtake and pass the stopped vehicle.

ABANDONED AUTOS

Help keep Hartland looking nice. Vehicles that are abandoned, junked, discarded, dismantled and unregistered may not be stored on private property in public view according to Hartland Municipal Code Section 62-12. This does not apply to vehicles kept in private garages.

IDENTITY THEFT

The Village of Hartland Police Department takes many different types of Identity Theft complaints every year. Some of the current reports or scams out there that we take reports on include ATM or gas pump skimmers, IRS fraud by having your social security number used to file income taxes, credit card breaches from large corporations, phishing scams in emails, people posing as utility workers or government employees to gain personal information from citizens, and theft from vehicles in which criminals use the victim's credit cards and personal checks to drain your bank account.

The following are some good ideas to use to protect yourself from becoming a victim in these types of situations.

- Limit the amount of credit/debit cards you carry with you.
- Do not carry your social security card or checkbook with you.
- Know the contents of your wallet or purse so you can cancel credit cards quickly should you become a victim.
- Do not leave valuables in your car and make sure to lock your vehicle.
- Monitor your bank accounts and credit on a regular basis.
- Only use secure websites while online.
- Use strong passwords for your accounts and do not store your passwords on your home computer.
- Have virus protection on your computer.
- Use caution when using an ATM or paying at the gas pump and report any suspicious activity to the police.
- Do not click on suspicious links sent to you via email or while browsing online.
- Use caution if someone claiming to be a bank employee, utility worker, or government employee asks for your personal information or credit card number over the phone. This is not how these types of institutions operate. It would be wise to call the company back and see if they legitimately had an employee call you.
- Businesses and government agencies will not ask for payments to be made through wire transfers or gift cards.

TRAFFIC INITIATIVES

The department participates in various national traffic initiatives during the year that are focused on safety belt use and/or impaired driving. By participating in reporting our traffic enforcement during the enforcement periods, we become eligible for \$4,000 equipment grants. Our department has received several of the grants in the past and that is how we have paid for the radar speed pole signs located on several major roads entering the village. This year we will participate in:

Click It or Ticket - May 24 to June 6, 2021

Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over - August 21, 2021 to September 7, 2021 and December 17, 2021 - January 1, 2022

MOVE OVER OR SLOW DOWN

To help safeguard law enforcement officers, emergency responders, road maintenance workers, and others who work on the side of the highways, Wisconsin has a “Move Over Law” (Wis. Stat. §346.072).

The law requires drivers to shift lanes or slow down in order to provide a “safety zone” for a squad car, ambulance, fire truck, tow truck, utility vehicle, or highway maintenance vehicle that is stopped on the side of a road with its warning lights flashing.

Drivers have two options for creating a safety zone:

- ◆ If the road has more than one directional lane, like the Interstate, and you can switch lanes safely, you must move over to vacate the lane closest to the law enforcement or other vehicle with its lights flashing.
- ◆ If the road has a single directional lane or you can't safely move over, you must reduce your speed.

Failure of motorists to move over is one of the reasons that motor vehicle crashes kill more law enforcement officers on duty than any other cause.



BURNING PERMITS

The Village does not allow any open burning except recreational fires such as small campfires on private property or small fires confined to burning pits. All fire pits, moveable and in ground, MUST obtain a burn permit. Recreational fires can be no more than three feet in diameter with flames that do not reach higher than three feet from the base of the fire. These fires also must be at least 15 feet from any type of building or structure, landscape items such as a tree, bush or fence or any combustible materials and must be surrounded by non-combustible materials such as concrete, rock or cement block. Be sure to check the wind speed in your area; the wind velocity shall not exceed 9 mph. Is it safe to burn? Visit dnr.wi.gov to view daily burning restrictions and danger.

A burning permit must be applied for prior to burning. Fire Department personnel will inspect the area prior to issuance of the permit to ensure safety. The cost for a burning permit is \$20 and is good for two years. Burning permits are available at the Fire Department, 150 Lawn St., weekdays between 7:30 am and 4:00 pm. Open burning regulations in the Village Code include:

- ◆ Sec. 38-113.—Burning leaves, brush, clean wood and other vegetative debris prohibited. Except as otherwise expressly provided in section 38-112, all burning of leaves, weeds, brush, stumps, clean wood, trees and other vegetative debris is prohibited within the Village of Hartland.
- ◆ Sec. 38-114.—Burn barrels prohibited. No person shall use or maintain a burn barrel in the Village of Hartland.
- ◆ Section 38-115.—Outdoor wood-fired furnaces prohibited. No person shall install, use or maintain an outdoor wood-fired furnace in the Village of Hartland.

STRUCTURE FIRE

Hartland Fire Department was dispatched for a structure fire on Millington Lane on March 31. The first unit arriving at the scene observed heavy fire from the front of the structure and extending to the attic. Having extensively preplanned this multi-family complex, Command immediately requested additional resources from surrounding agencies. The first crew conducted a blitz attack while a second crew entered the fire unit to conduct a rapid primary search, continue extinguishment and limit horizontal spread. Searches were completed of all adjacent units and firefighters worked to limit fire spread through the attic across multiple units. The incident remains under investigation.



GRILLING SAFETY

Propane Grills

Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. Apply a light soap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a gas leak by smell or soapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off both the gas tank and the grill and get it serviced by a professional before using. If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. **DO NOT MOVE THE GRILL.**

- ⇒ Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- ⇒ The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- ⇒ Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
- ⇒ Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- ⇒ Never leave your grill unattended.
- ⇒ Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.



Charcoal Grills

- ⇒ There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
- ⇒ If you use a starter fluid use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- ⇒ Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- ⇒ There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- ⇒ When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container. **DO NOT DISPOSE OF HOT COALS IN THE TRASH!**

Cooking Equipment on Balconies

For other than one and two family dwellings, **NO FUEL** for a hibachi grill, charcoal grill or other similar devices used for cooking, heating, or any other purpose, shall be **STORED** or kindled on any balcony or under any overhanging portion or within 10 feet of any structure. Electric grills may be used **ONLY** if they are UL listed and do not have an exposed heating element. The State of Wisconsin adopted NFPA1 2012 Fire Prevention Code which restricts the use of cooking grills for residential multifamily buildings of three or more units.

FIREWORKS SAFETY

Fireworks are often used to mark special events and holidays. The only safe way to view fireworks is to attend a professional show. It is important to know that fireworks are not safe in the hands of consumers. Each July 4th, thousands of people, most often children and teens, are injured while using consumer fireworks. Despite the dangers of fireworks, few people understand the associated risks—devastating burns, other injuries, fires and even death. According to the National Fire Protection Association:

- ◆ Fireworks started an estimated 19,500 fires nationwide in 2018, including 1,900 structure fires, 500 vehicle fires and 17,100 outside and other fires. These fires caused five deaths, 46 civilian injuries and \$105 million in direct property damage..
- ◆ Burns account for 44% of the 9,100 injuries treated in emergency rooms seen in the month around July 4.
- ◆ Half of the fireworks injuries seen at emergency rooms were extremities: hand, finger, or leg. One-third were to the eye or other parts of the head.
- ◆ Children ages 10-14 had the highest rate of fireworks injury with more than one-third (36%) of the victims of injuries under age 15.
- ◆ Sparklers account for roughly one-quarter of emergency room fireworks injuries. Burning at up to 2,000 degrees, sparklers are hot enough to burn metal, hot enough to bake a cake, and hot enough to boil water.


DOG LICENSES REQUIRED

Dog licenses are required in the Village of Hartland under Municipal Code Article III Section 14-61. Dog licenses expire yearly on December 31st. The cost per license is \$10 for spayed/neutered animals and \$15 for intact animals. A late fee of \$5 is charged for licenses applied for after March 31st for renewals.

When applying in person or by mail for a dog license, a copy of the rabies vaccination certificate including name of veterinarian and date of vaccine as well as expiration date must be submitted before a license can be issued per State Statutes. Licenses and payment receipts will be mailed within two weeks. Licenses may also be obtained by coming into the office.
